History of the Eustis Fire Department

The origins of the City of Eustis Fire Department date back to 1883 when it was a fire bucket brigade with an all-volunteer department. During this time, the only way firefighters were alerted about a fire were from citizens shouting fire.

A hand-drawn wagon was the first fire truck used by the fire department.

1887

- Mr. L.N. Herrick donated the first fire alarm bell to the Eustis Fire Department
- Night Watchmen were hired and paid \$20 a month to look out for fires and ring the bell

1899

The Eustis Fire Department had one of its first big fires and the Lake Region Newspaper burned to the
ground. The newspaper was first published on October 23, 1884 as a weekly publication. After it was
acquired by Ansil Daniel Miller, the newspaper joined the Associated News Service and became a daily

1900

- A stationary gas Engine Pumper was purchased
- The annual Fire Department budget was \$9,238

1922

- A 500-gallon motorized Pumper Truck was purchased
- The first paid Fire Chief was hired, Edward S. Reeves
- The famous 150-room Ocklawaha Hotel (a premier winter resort) burned down

Early Fire Apparatus

Today the Eustis Fire Department has two fire stations, Station 22 and Station 23. Station 22 is the main station and is located at 100 West Norton Avenue. Station 23 is located at 1800 Hicks Ditch Road.

Under the direction of Fire Chief Michael Swanson, the department provides administrative, inspection, rescue, vehicle extrication and suppression services to our community. Its 21 uniformed members protect a 12.57 square mile area, with a population of more than 19,000. The Eustis Fire Department typically responds to over 4,000 calls per year and also provides mutual aid to neighboring cities and county area.
